Dr. Lawrence Mohr Jr., Board of Regents Member

Dr. Lawrence Mohr Jr., is a professor of medicine and the director of the Environmental Biosciences Program at the Medical University of South Carolina.

Dr. Mohr received an A.B. degree with the highest honors from the University of North Carolina, where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and was presented the Merck Award for excellence in chemistry. He received his medical degree from the University of North Carolina School of Medicine. His postdoctoral training includes a medical internship, a residency in internal medicine and fellowship training in pulmonary medicine, all taking place at Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Washington, D.C.

Dr. Mohr served as the chief resident in the Department of Medicine at Walter Reed from 1982 until 1983. He was then assigned to Fort Lewis, Washington, where he served as the command surgeon in the 9th Infantry Division Support Command, which was also the Army's High Technology Test Bed. During that time, he directed the development and testing of new methods of battlefield medical support, which have since been incorporated into Army doctrine. He subsequently returned to Walter Reed before being assigned as the White House Physician in 1987. From 1987 to 1993 he served as White House Physician on the staffs of President Ronald Reagan and President George H.W. Bush.

Dr. Mohr has served on numerous government, scientific and professional boards and committees. He lectures both nationally and internationally, has authored multiple scientific publications and has edited two books: "International Case Studies in Risk Assessment" and "Management and Biomarkers: Medical and Workplace Applications."

His professional honors include: the Outstanding Medical Resident Award at Walter Reed, the General Graves B. Erskine Award, the Order of Military Medical Merit, and a Life Saving Commendation from the United States Secret Service. He is listed in Who's Who in the World, Who's Who in America, Who's Who in Science and Engineering, Who's Who in Medicine and Healthcare, and Best Doctors in America.

His military decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal; the Silver Star Medal; four awards of the Bronze Star Medal, with two "V" devices for heroism in ground combat; the Purple Heart; two awards of the Meritorious Service Medal; the Air Medal; two Awards of the Army Commendation Medal; the National Defense Service Medal; the Vietnam Service Medal; and the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal.
