CLEVELAND NATIVE RECEIVES GRADUATE DEGREE AT USU

BETHESDA, Md. – A Cleveland, Ohio, native is one of this year's 49 graduates of the Uniformed Services University's F. Edward Hebert School of Medicine graduate program in the biomedical sciences.

Sara Newman, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Donald Freedheim of Cleveland, received her doctor of public health degree at the university's 23rd commencement May 18 at Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C.

Newman, who gave the graduate student farewell, was also the recipient of the USU Graduate Student Award and the Henry M. Jackson Foundation Fellowship in Medical Sciences Award.

USU began its graduate education program in 1977 and since then, 714 students have received master's or doctorate degrees here. Both civilians and military members are eligible for USU's graduate programs in the biomedical sciences.

USU was established by Congress under the Department of Defense in 1972 and has the nation's only fully accredited federal school of medicine and graduate school of nursing. With its motto "Learning to Care for Those in Harm's Way," the university has a worldwide reputation as a center of excellence for military medical education and research.
